I thought that all the Wider Quaker Newsletters had been loaded onto the Quaker website but that is not the case. The paper file goes back almost to the beginning of the WQN in New Zealand, but many early letters are missing. The file currently starts with letter 11 written by Frances Menefy in 1980. If anyone has a stash of the early letters I would appreciate having them. I had not realised that the Wider Quaker Fellowship was originally an initiative of FWCC.

Does anyone know any more of the history?

Apparently from time to time in New Zealand the WQF letter writer would give an explanation of the organisation of New Zealand Yearly Meeting and Monthly meetings and so on. That is not something that I want to do. Just about everything about NZ Quakers can be found on the website - www.quakers.nz



What I do want to talk about is a book, this is the new revision of the New Zealand Friends' "Quaker Handbook: The Handbook of Practice and Procedure".

New Zealand Friends should be able to find the new Handbook on the website (I confess I couldn't find it), or obtain a physical copy from your Monthly Meeting, or I think, you may be able to buy one from Quaker Book Sales quaker.books@quaker.org.nz

In most rooms set up for Meeting for Worship in New Zealand there will be a small table in the centre of the circle with flowers, the Bible, and some relevant Quaker books or magazines. The Handbook, despite being important is not

usually there. Instead you will find one or more Faith and Practice books (New Zealand, Australian, and British versions), a copy of Advices and Queries, perhaps a Quaker Hymnal, and pamphlets for new enquirers.

Perhaps we should have the new handbook on the table. There is a very useful glossary at the beginning (Quaker language can sometimes be mystifying to newcomers), and section **1.1.1 Purpose of the Quaker Handbook** outlines exactly what the book is intended to do

The Handbook is a practical and informative guide to Quaker practice in Aotearoa New Zealand. It is not a rigid set of rules and regulations but a description of what has evolved as a result of our experience of working and seeking together.

It is intended variously for use as a "how to" manual; as a reference book; and as a guide to deepening one's understanding of the Religious Society of Friends. We hope that all will find it useful, particularly those who:

- are new to the Society,
- have been newly appointed to a committee,
- have been entrusted with a task rarely performed,
- want to find out more about Friends' practices,
- wish to reflect more deeply on Quaker life.

From the time I became active in my local Worship Group I constantly referred to the handbook as it was then. While it is always important to have the guidance of experienced Friends when taking on a job in the meeting, it is a great benefit to be able to refer to the written suggestions and direction. I found it particularly helpful when on what is now called the Pastoral Care committee. The year I joined that committee we opened every meeting with a discussion of one of the concerns listed in the Handbook for that committee.

I consider Quakers a do- it- yourself religious organisation. In New Zealand we don't have ministers or pastors to take the responsibility for running things. We only rarely pay people to do specific tasks. So not only do-it- ourselves but amateur as well. We need this little handbook. It is very well and clearly written. The type is a good size for most of us. Between the table of contents and the index we should be able to find the answers to most of our queries about the organisation.

This revision has been in the works for several decades; goodness I was on that committee about ten years ago. It is extremely pleasing to me to see the new book . But please note, as life goes on further revision, additions, and deletions will be necessary. For now, however, the task has been completed.
