She is involved in the remake of the national Quaker website as part of the YM Outreach Committee and the Website Oversight Committee, which will occupy a lot of time through to February next year.

Phillida to talk on American Quaker Women who changed our world



"American Quaker Women Who Changed Our World"

You are invited to a Talk in celebration of the 400th anniversary of Quakers
The Library Nelson Saturday November 23rd at 1 pm.

Tensions at the heart of the recent American election are long standing and go back to the early years of the American Republic. In 1783 when the War of American Independence ended and the new nation of the United States was established the central question facing the new nation was, (and still is), what would the new state stand for? Was it founded on violence of race-based chattel slavery, the sexual exploitation of women and the sale of their children. Or on free labour, equal opportunity and inclusion?

The Declaration of Independence of 1776 declared the 'self-evident' truth 'that all men are created equal... and... endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights'. Quakers were the first and most consistent religious group to insist that 'all men' meant 'all' - women and men, black, white and indigenous people and that lasting peace required recognition of this simple fact.

Quakers, especially Quaker women, were at the very centre of the intense public debate about the nature of the democracy that emerged between 1783 when the American War of Independence ended and 1861 when the Civil War began. Abolitionist Quaker women worked tirelessly against war and violence. They challenged the violence and sexual exploitation endemic to slavery. They promoted temperance, non-violent resistance and the equal franchise and education for black and white, women and men.

Phillida traces four women whose remarkable lives are central to the debate about the nature of the new country. They established free schools, clinics and hospitals for the poor and opened the first medical schools for women. Will the opportunities they pioneered survive?

Parihaka Day – a day of commemoration and celebration:



Archdeacon Harvey Ruru led the Dawn Blessing on Parihaka Day, November 5th, 2024, in Anzac Park at 5.30am with the sun already reddening the sky in the east, and the birds in full chorus. It is always a special spiritual time. This year speakers drew connections between the non-violence

demonstrated at Parihaka in 1881 and wars unfolding in Palestine/Israel, Lebanon and the Ukraine. After the Blessing, Te Mana Hā, a Roopu of wāhine from different ethnic backgrounds who live and work in Whakatū welcomed those manuhiri able

to attend the Parakuihi across the road at the Bridge Club rooms with a karakia kai. Te Mana Hā are committed to learning Te Reo Māori and singing waiata Māori in our community. Maria Oxnam offered on behalf of the group to tautoko the Parihaka Day Dawn Blessing. Te Mana Ha sung beautiful waiata during breakfast for about 80 manuhiri.

At 1pm Donna McLeod spoke movingly to 30 members of the public gathered at the Richmond Library. Entitled My story, your story, our story she wove together her connections to Parihaka, the connections of local people to the constabulary which invaded Parihaka, and the time spent by Te Whiti and Tohu Kakahi under house arrest in Nelson immediately following the sacking of the village.

<u>Tautoko Te Tiriti o Waitangi</u>

In preparation for our Home Discussion this Wednesday:

- i) Information from Yearly Meeting ... our YM Clerks are being active in collecting information to send out soon, particularly on making submissions to Select Committees, and on arrangements for joining the Hikoi mō te Tiriti, either when it is close to us, or in Wellington. They have attended a "National Dialogue for Christian Unity" meeting, at which Alistair Reese was the invited speaker. He covered much of the material from his book "He Tatau Pounamu" which we looked at in our last Home Discussion.
 - ii) the Hīkoi mō te Tiriti ... is anyone keen to go to Wellington, and would our Meeting consider funding for a contingent of us to be there on 19 November? (I haven't worked out what the logistics of that would be, possibly a return trip on the Ferry, which would involve an overnight stay in Wellington ... otherwise return airfares on the day.)
 - iii) Contributing to a Quaker Statement on the Bill. Could we begin putting together a Statement? YM Clerks suggest that if we did that, it could be forwarded to our newly appointed Urgent Submissions Group (Gray Southon and Marilyn Head) to be distributed for approval by Monthly Meetings and then Yearly Meeting.
 - iv) Generating public veneration of Te Tiriti. Could we initiate a "meme" campaign. We have the idea of a T-shirt with a slogan on it (e.g. "I love Te Tiriti"), or a hongi image similar to the one on our Embroidery. Could we design some posters? Other ways of putting memes out there?

We hope you can make it to this important discussion and planning meeting.
