More about those Emissions Trading Scheme national consultations

Te Arotake Mahere Hokohoko Tukunga Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS) review "focuses on the benefits, trade-offs and risks of changing the NZ ETS so it can to incentivise gross emissions reductions, but continue to support removals. It follows advice from He Pou a Rangi | Climate Change Commission [which] recommended that ... Government consider amending the NZ ETS to provide more robust support for gross emissions reductions and manage the amount of exotic forest planting driven by the scheme".

Materials include the full consultation document; summary consultation; document; te reo Māori summary consultation document; and a vehicle for making a quick submission (four questions). The Cabinet paper is here.

International news from QUNO

QUNO's team at the recent <u>United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)</u> negotiations (SB58) in Bonn (June 5 – June 15) was the Representative for the Human Impacts of Climate Change (HICC), Lindsey Fielder Cook, and HICC programme assistant Alana M Carlson.

Alana distributed her briefing paper on "Fair Sources of Finance for a New Loss and Damage Funding Arrangement," written in collaboration with Britain Yearly Meeting and UK based Faith for the Climate. I recommend watching QUNO's interactive side event featuring our own Kay Harrison (Climate Change Ambassador). The event titled "Truthful engagement in real, effective and ethical climate action for an ambitious Global Stocktake," included panelists from the negotiation, research, activist, community organizer and legal experience sectors. It was led by QUNO and the Federation of American Women's Clubs Overseas (FAWCO), with co-hosts from Britain Yearly, Quaker Earthcare Witness, and the Friends World Committee for Consultation.

Recommended viewing is also Lindsey's involvement as part of an inter-faith press conference on the moral call to action. She addressed the importance of dealing with the root causes of climate change and stated that "Moral imperative is the most powerful grounding of our work because it is not necessarily political, it is from the heart." The Bonn Conference was in preparation for UN Climate Conference (COP 28) to be held in Dubai during November-December this year.
