Thanks to Joel, Anne, Alistair, and Marilyn, Aotearoa NZ Quakers were able to rapidly craft a <u>submission</u> seeking the withdrawal of the *Crown Minerals Amendment Bill* with 20 minutes to spare. The Bill promotes petroleum exploration and production and therefore reverses Aotearoa New Zealand's Quaker supported climate change policies about moving away from fossil fuels. We reiterated our post-Covid desire for a government which *leads with integrity, shares information based on evidence, and engages with communities prior to decision-making*.

Trying to understand – are we at cross-roads?

1. Pacific peoples' action

a. At CHOGM, Tuvalu's Prime Minister and others warned Australia, Canada and the UK that they are responsible for over 60 percent of emissions generated from extraction across Commonwealth

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countries since 1990 despite having 6 percent of the population (<u>Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty</u> <u>Initiative report</u>).

- b. Samoa Fiji, Solomon Islands, Tonga ,Niue, Palau, Nauru, Republic of Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, Timor-Leste, Antigua and Barbuda, and Colombia have all joined Vanuatu and Tuvalu's call for a <u>Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty (FFNPT)</u>. Other supporters include both <u>Wellington City and Kāpiti</u> District Council.
- c. Pacific Churches declared [o]ur stories are the lived realities of the science of climate change and the result of a lack of commitment and action to reduce carbon emissions, phase out fossil fuels and change from unsustainable lifestyles and development models <u>Tuakoi-Lei decaration</u>, May 2024.
- d. Vanuatu spearheaded a call to the International Court of Justice to clarify countries legal obligations to combat climate change and protect vulnerable communities. <u>Aotearoa NZ</u> was a co-sponsor of the call. Hearings are due to begin 12 December 2024.
- e. Aotearoa NZ Quakers are the only Aotearoa NZ national faith organisation to have signed the call for a <u>Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty</u>. Aotearoa NZ Quakers *are the only Polynesian country represented in the world Quaker family*.

2. Global challenges

- a. COP 28 last year committed to move away from fossil fuels. <u>Simon Watts</u>, our Climate Change Minister told COP 28 ... New Zealand remains resolutely focused on transitioning to a low-emissions future; to supporting Pacific resilience and collectively decarbonising the global economy. ... We're also committed to collaborating with our Pacific neighbours on climate change. It is the number one security threat to our region. ... The commitment of New Zealanders from across all levels of government, the private sector, NGOs, iwi Māori, is clear.
- b. Following COP 28 ... every extraction wealthy country developed and developing had plans to increase their oil and gas extraction <u>Lindsey Fielder Cook</u> (QUNO).
- c. The multilateral environment has many pressures; military conflicts, high levels of debt, fears about supply chains, and food insecurity.
- d. <u>Huge amounts of money are needed</u> for humanitarian aid, climate finance, Loss and Damage to help those lives already destroyed by climate change these remain underfunded or based on loans rather than grants in a world increasingly crippled by debt <u>Lindsey Fielder Cook</u>.
- e. Watch these themes at <u>COP 29</u>. Join the Aussies <u>prayers and meditations for COP 29</u>.

3. What about Aotearoa NZ?

The pressure is on and maybe Taranaki is symbolic of challenges we face?

- a. Government tells us <u>Aotearoa NZ</u> has a problem around<u>energy security</u>; one reason for the rush over the Crown Minerals Amendment Bill.
- b. Three weeks ago, <u>sea-bed mining</u> in Taranaki for iron ore, vanadium and titanium was included among prioritised <u>Fast-Track projects</u> (used for renewable power sources) despite <u>local iwi concern.</u>

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- c. A few days ago, Bluefloat Energy (Spanish) cancelled plans to build a <u>wind farm</u> off the Taranaki coast, saying there were issues around about<u>sea bed mining proximity</u>.
- d. Yesterday, Aotearoa NZ and other CHOGM participants signed the <u>Apia Commonwealth Ocean</u> <u>Declaration</u> designed to help protect ocean environments.
- e. <u>Stuart Horne</u>, Aotearoa New Zealand's new Climate Change Ambassador will be at COP 29. Previous postings include Samoa and Brussels. He has led MFAT's Middle East and African Division.
