We are in our sixth day of negotiations to approve the <u>IPCC Synthesis Report</u>, a day over time and nowhere near finished. Tensions are frayed on minimal sleep, and countries are already scheduled to depart. In the midst of this, Bronwyn, ...quietly thanked me for fighting to maintain important language in past IPCC texts. I was quite moved.

... I wished her strength and said how New Zealand Quakers upheld this work. She turned to me and said, 'They sent us a letter of support. It meant so much to us.' ...

Thank you. The letter still gives them strength. What Light you give. Please keep holding them all – scientists, diplomats, UN, civil society - in the Light.

Getting busy

Help end the era of coal, oil and gas in the Pacific

Ministers from six Pacific / Te Moana-nui-a-Kiwa countries — Fiji, Tonga, Niue, Vanuatu, Tuvalu, and the Solomon Islands – as well as international partners and regional organisations have created the <u>Port Vila Call for a Just Transition to a Fossil Fuel Free</u> <u>Pacific</u> and <u>want it publicised</u>.

It is astonishing. These countries have such low per capita carbon emissions, and <u>yet bear</u> <u>the brunt of harsh weather events</u>. Carbon emissions per capita in 2019 by metric ton were as follows: Nuie (?); <u>Solomon Islands</u> 0.5; <u>Vanuatu</u> 0.7; <u>Tuvalu</u> 0.9; <u>Fiji</u> 1.8; <u>Tonga</u> 1.5; <u>New</u> <u>Zealand</u> 6.8; <u>North America</u> 14.8; <u>Australia</u> 15.3; <u>World average per capita</u> 4.4. I am not sure why Australia's emissions are so high?

Back to IPCC

This is a big one for Quakers, and for the world. <u>Quaker</u> <u>United Nations Office (QUNO)</u> is part of <u>Friends World</u> <u>Committee for Consultation (FWCC)</u>, and we are all part of FWCC.

<u>QUNO has been involved</u> in the negotiations to finalise the language of the <u>Synthesis Report</u> of the <u>Intergovernmental</u>

Panel on Climate Change (IPCC); the report which



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communicates the latest climate science to policy makers worldwide; i.e., it is very significant. IPCC is up to its 6th cycle of investigations, and the Synthesis Report is the crunched down result. It covers the <u>Physical Science</u>, <u>Adaptation and Vulnerability</u>, and <u>Mitigation of Climate Change</u>.

QUNO made 24 interventions in the report negotiations largely on "the need for urgent, real, transformative, rights-based and ethical climate policies to protect this beautiful planet and all species". <u>Earth Negotiations Bulletin highlighted the QUNO interventions an</u> <u>unprecedented 21 times</u>. All 24 can be read in their entirety, along with their relevant text and the response they received <u>here</u>.

QUNO also delivered its own closing statement and one on behalf of the Inuit Circumpolar Conference which can be watched <u>here</u>.

I have looked at the <u>Summary for Policy Makers</u>, but not read it all. It is 36 pages and has some great diagrams.
