## So, what is in **Budget NZ?**

Hon James Shaw lists climate change measures such as free public transport for children; half price fares for people under 25; major expansion of nationwide EV charging network; accelerating the uptake of low-emission heavy vehicles like trucks and buses; reducing energy bills with 100,000 more insulation and heating retrofits; renewable energy system for Chatham Island to halve household electricity bills; community-scale renewable energy generation and storage projects; building resilience for Westport; and, supporting funding for emissions reductions through New Zealand Green Investment Finance.

### ANZ Quakers, Climate change, QUNO, and the consultation

Yay. Our submission on *International Climate Negotiations* got sent, on time, and is <u>on the website with its very own link</u> after Liz's patient lesson in what to do.

How we produced our 'how to approach <u>International Climate Negotiations</u> consultation' response requested by <u>Climate Change Ambassador</u>, Kay Harrison via QUNO, was miraculous. I panicked. Gray had an idea. We began. Some Quakers provided moral support; some supplied wide-ranging knowledge; others rescued potential blunders; some gently reminded us to stick to what ANZ Quakers could definitely say because either we had said it before, or it was contained in the <u>Faith Leaders Statement</u>, or QUNO had said it for

us. Then came the Shapers, the Focusers, the Fixers, and Proof-Readers. We learned both about climate issues and about what we could and could not say. Kay (and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade) got the submission. Thank you all.

## Consultation realisations - what can we say?

Quaker thinking and process has much to offer. Listening; lots of listening. Finding ways forward; climate justice and what that means; acknowledging difficult truths; seeing strengths; noticing what works and what does not; supporting those negotiating, and so much more. Right now, at Yearly Meeting, we are using our <a href="https://example.com/handbook">handbook</a>, renewing our understandings of Quaker processes, and recognising the validity of what we do know.
