Budget 2024

Described as a <u>war on nature</u> (thank you Justin); I am trying to figure what has been cut and what has been reallocated (thank you Jonathan for the <u>helpful list</u>). I have attempted to link Budget points to our discussion with our Climate Change Ambassador and Quaker United Nations Office climate person at Yearly Meeting. Here goes:

- 1. Keep talking /engaging with people we don't agree with Quakers may find things not to agree with around:
 - 9% decrease in Managing Climate Change in New Zealand (from around \$55 m (p.13).
 - 13% (\$2.33 million) decrease in the <u>Climate Change Commission's advisory and monitoring</u> <u>function</u> budget (from \$18. 4m (p.27).
 - \$600,000 per annum Environmental Legal Assistance Fund disappearing (p.5).
 - Funds to <u>reduce reliance on cars and support the uptake of active ... shared travel modes</u>, <u>such as walking, cycling and public transport</u> are being halved (\$100 m to \$55m (p.10)).
 - Decrease of \$550,000 for the Prime Minister's Chief Science Advisor (p.33).
- 2. **Support Pacific voices -** Aotearoa NZ's annual \$1.4m funding for the <u>Pacific Co-operation</u> <u>Foundation</u> just got deleted (p.3). The <u>Climate Change Development Fund</u> for *supporting*

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international projects to assist developing countries address climate change issues is also abolished (it was \$270,000 per year (p.5)).

Meantime, Tuvalu and others have obtained an Advisory Opinion from the <u>International</u> <u>Tribunal for the Law of the Sea</u>. The Tribunal describes greenhouse gases as a form of <u>marine</u> <u>pollution</u>, and has declared that peoples and their governments are to protect the marine environment from climate change impacts and ocean acidification (Thank you Adrian G).

- Support our Aotearoa NZ international meeting representatives to 'do the right thing'. It may have just got harder for our representatives. Vote Foreign Affairs includes savings of \$22.8 million on <u>New Zealand's International Climate Finance Commitment</u> (p.10).
- 4. Engage with interfaith groupings Increasingly care for creation / climate initiatives are coming from interfaith activities. Mary Rose is involved in one in Tauranga; Richard Milne and I are involved in the Religious Diversity Centre's climate action group; I know there is a group in Palmerston North. Maybe other Quakers are involved in others. For inspiration see the Pacific Conference of Churches OTIN TAAI +20 Conference 2024 closing session and Lindsey Fielder Cook's presentation to <u>The First Congregational Church in Sheffield</u>.
- 5. **Spiritual, financial, connections with QUNO**. I am attending the climate stream of the Quaker World Plenary in Johannesburg in person in August. All thoughts on what you want us to be listening for and saying are welcome.
- 6. Send people to QUNO summer school I suggest we make a budget case for two annual bursaries to enable a young person from A/NZ Friends and a Friend from a less developed country in the Asia West Pacific Section to participate? Anyone know how we go about doing that?
- Take part in submission writing, online webinars, consultations etc. Plenty of opportunity here: Local Government (Water Services Preliminary Arrangements) Bill; Resource Management (Extended Duration of Coastal Permits for Marine Farms) Amendment Bill; Resource Management (Freshwater and Other Matters) Amendment Bill; also, regional and district plans.
- 8. Recognise climate change issues rest beyond one Minister e.g.:
 - Agriculture <u>Sustainable Land Management and Climate Change Research</u> has decreased by \$13.6m (from \$109,311,000) (p.9)
 - Transport rail is being cut from \$1,844m in 2024/25 down to \$219 m in 2027/28 (p.26)
 - Internal affairs <u>funds for natural hazard events have almost doubled</u> \$5,422,000 to \$9,800,000 (p.43)
 - Business, Science and Innovation <u>Supporting Regional Just Transitions</u> \$6,909,000 budgeted in 23/24; \$1,699,000 budgeted in 24/25 (p.15), and <u>Renewable Energy in</u> <u>Communities and Public and Māori housing</u> falls from \$27,736,000 in 23/24 to \$8,748,000 in 24/25 (p.15)
- Recognise we need a whole of government approach Although 'Climate' was relegated to the second to last page of the 2024 <u>budget speech</u>, we do have the Finance and Expenditure Committee's <u>Inquiry into Climate Adaptation</u> (consultation closes 16 June).
