Submission writing - <u>New Zealand's second emissions reduction plan</u> – Submissions are **due 21** August. NZ is committed to net zero emissions by 2050. "... Emissions budgets 1 and 2 can be achieved. There is greater uncertainty about our ability to meet emissions budget 3 (2030)." See <u>Ministry for the Environment p. 2</u>.

What we know:

Climate Change Ambassador, <u>Kay Harrison</u>, who came to our Yearly Meeting has resigned, and is now listing herself as a 'self-employed climate change consultant' on LinedIn.

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Actearoa NZ is <u>not on track</u> to meet its 2030 obligation of reducing net emissions to 50% below 2005 levels by 2030 (<u>Ministry for the Environment</u>, p.29).

Simon Watts, our Climate Change Minister, committed to the following at the <u>United Nations Conference of the Parties 28</u> (COP 28):

• Reducing net greenhouse gas emissions by 50 per cent below gross 2005 levels by 2030 and achieving our 2050 domestic net zero target. Maybe I am wrong, but it looks like <u>net emissions</u> reduced by 5.4% between 2005 and 2022, so 2030 looks highly optimistic.

• **Focusing equally on adaptation and mitigation**. The new five pillar approach to climate change appears to focus on adaptation.

• **Developing a national Climate Adaptation Framework**. In August 2023, the Environment Committee initiated an inquiry into climate adaptation. A summary of the submissions can be found <u>here</u>. The <u>Finance and Expenditure Committee</u> is now considering those submissions and is due to report by 5 September 2024.

• Collaborating with our Pacific neighbours on climate change as ... the number one security threat to our region. Climate change is one of the seven priorities announced at the recent 10th Pacific Islands Leaders Meeting (PALM10). Meantime, Pacific peoples are already moving.

• Delivering on our collective commitment to the US \$100 billion goal, and on loss and damage finance, in a way that works for our partners in the Pacific. "Finance needs to flow in the right direction" (Kay Harrison, former Climate Change ambassador). [rather than subsidising fossil fuels]. Loss and damage will be part of the <u>COP</u> 29 focus. The <u>Pacific Conference of Churches</u>' Tuākoi Lei Declaration calls for "just transitions towards a fossil fuel free world" amongst other things.
